

CHRISTIAS Lot the young Ellen G. White

The 25th of December has long been commemorated as the day of Jesus' birth, and in this article it is not my purpose to affirm or question the propriety of celebrating this event on this day, but to dwell upon the childhood and life of our Saviour. It is my purpose to call the attention of the children to the humble manner in which the Redeemer came to the world. All heaven was interested in the great event of Christ's advent to earth. Heavenly messengers came to make known the birth of the long-promised, long-expected Saviour to the humble shepherds who were watching their flocks by night on the plains of Bethlehem. The first manifestation that attracted the

notice of the shepherds at the birth of the Saviour was a radiant light in the starry heavens, which filled them with wonder and admiration. "And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:9-14).

Dear children, shall not these precious words, coming from the lips of heavenly angels, find a response in our hearts? Shall they not awaken gladness and melody in the soul because Jesus has come to our world to bring back to God those who through sin were estranged from Him? If the angels of heaven glorified God, and poured forth their joy in divine melody and sacred song over the plains of Bethlehem, shall our hearts be cold and unimpressible? Shall we with indifference turn from the salvation brought to light through Christ?

The astonished shepherds could scarcely comprehend the precious message borne to them by the angels, and when the radiant light had passed away, they said one to another, "Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us. And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child" (verses 15-17).

They were filled with joy; they could not keep to themselves the precious knowledge of the advent of the Redeemer, but with glad enthusiasm they told to all whom they met the wonderful things they had seen and heard;

and all who heard them, related the wonderful experience of the shepherds to the others, and many wondered and rejoiced, for they believed the words that had been spoken by the heavenly messengers. Glorifying and praising God, the shepherds returned to their flocks on the plains of Bethlehem.

All heaven was moved on the occasion of the Saviour's birth. The triumphant song which the shepherds heard was only an echo of the praise resounding round the throne on high. The whole angelic host rejoiced and sung praises because salvation was presented as a free gift to fallen man. After the proclamation song to the shepherds, the heavenly multitude veiled their faces from human sight, the flood of heavenly light passed away, the thrilling song of praise was no longer heard by the shepherds; but the remembrance of that song could never die out of their hearts. O, what reason have we to praise God that this wonderful revelation from heaven was made to humble men! It is not those who occupy high positions, who hold most honored places in the world, who are selected as bearers of God's message of peace and salvation, which is of the greatest interest to fallen men. The Lord has said, "Thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes" (Luke 10:21).



Those who love God should feel deeply interested in the children and vouth. To them God can reveal His truth and salvation. Jesus calls the little ones that believe on Him the lambs of His flock. He has a special love for and interest in the children. Jesus has said. "Suffer little children. and forbid them not, to come unto me [let no one place any obstruction in the way of the children's coming to Me1: for of such is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 19:14). Jesus has passed through the trials and griefs to which childhood is subject. He knows the sorrows of the young. By His Holy Spirit, He is drawing the hearts of the children to Himself, while Satan is working to keep them away from Him. The most precious offering that the children can give to Jesus is the freshness of their childhood. When children seek the Lord with the whole heart. He will be found of them. It is in these early years that the affections are the most ardent, the heart most susceptible of improvement. Everything that is seen and heard makes an impression on the vouthful mind. The countenances looked upon, the words uttered. the actions performed, are

not the least of the books the voung read: for they have a decided influence upon the mind, heart, and character. Then how important it is that the children come to Jesus in their earliest vears and become lambs of His flock! How important it is that the older members of the church, by precept and example, lead them to Jesus, who taketh away the sin of the world, and who can keep them by His divine grace from the ruin it works. The better acquainted they become with Jesus, the more they will love Him. and be able to do those things that are pleasing in His sight. God has sanctified childhood in that He gave His only begotten Son to become a child on earth.

What matchless love Jesus has manifested for a fallen world! If angels sung because the Saviour was born in Bethlehem, shall not our hearts echo the glad strain, Glory to God in the highest, peace on earth, good will to men? Although we do not know the exact day of Christ's birth, we would honor the sacred event. May the Lord forbid that anyone should be so narrow-minded as to overlook the event because there is an uncertainty in regard



to the exact time. Let us do what we can to fasten the minds of the children upon those things which are precious to everyone who loves Jesus. Let us teach them how Jesus came into the world to bring hope, comfort, peace, and happiness to all. The angels explained the reason of their great joy, saying, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." Then, children and youth. as you celebrate the coming Christmas, will you not count up the many things for which you are to be grateful, and will you not present a gratitude offering to Christ, and so reveal that you do appreciate the heavenly Gift?

The angels were amazed at the great love of Christ that led Him to suffer and die on Calvary to rescue man from the power of Satan. The work of redemption is a marvel to the angels of heaven. Why, then, are we, for whom so great a salvation has been provided, so indifferent, so cold and unloving? Children, you can do errands for Jesus which will be wholly acceptable to Him. You can bring your little gifts and offerings to Christ. The wise men who were guided by the star to

the place where the young child was, brought offerings of gold and frankincense and myrrh. When they found the Promised One, they worshiped Him. Children, you may ask, "What gifts can we bring to Jesus?" You can give Him your hearts. What offering is so sacred as the soul temple cleansed from its defilement of sin? Jesus stands knocking at the door of your hearts: will vou let Him in? He savs. "Behold. I stand at the door. and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me" (Revelation 3:20). Will you let Jesus into your hearts? Will you clear away the rubbish, and throw open the door. and willingly, gladly welcome in your heavenly guest? I shall not need to plead with you to bring vour thank offerings to God if vou will but let the Saviour in. You will be so grateful, that you cannot be restrained from laying your gifts at the feet of Jesus. Let the hearts of all respond with exceeding joy for the priceless aift of the Son of God.—The Review and Herald. December 17. 1889.

Spiritual Math

ath may not be your favorite subject, but I am sure you'll love spiritual math! Spiritual math is where we use the rules of mathematics to solve spiritual problems. For instance, the Bible says that "the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God" (1 Corinthians 3:19). So if we take wisdom apart from God it is called foolishness. We could then make an equation with this. Wisdom (w) minus God (infinity) or " ∞ " (w - ∞ = - ∞) is negative infinity, or so far behind zero that it cannot be written out. In other words, negative infinity is infinite loss. However, if you add God to the equation, then you have the opposite result: $(w + \infty = \infty)$ infinite gain!

Math is actually used a lot in Scripture, like in the prophecy about the Messiah where seventy weeks (70 x 7 = 490), or 490 years, are determined (subtracted) from the 2300 [Daniel 9:24]. Another prophecy speaks about the dividing of time [Daniel 7:25]. Peter tells us to add [2 Peter 1:5].

When John is counting the angels, multiplication is used [Revelation 5:11], and Jesus tells us to forgive seventy times seven (70 x 7 = 490) [Matthew 18:22].

Okay, let's use math to solve a really big spiritual problem. That problem is sin. According to the Bible, the wages of sin is death. Wages are what is paid when you finish a task and is judged or determined complete. So sin (s) plus judgment (j) equals death (d). Lets put it into an equation: (s + j = d). Now we have the problem stated, but we actually don't like the result. How can we avoid having this equation as part of our life? Let's use some more math to solve the problem.

The well-known verse in John 3:16 tells us that God loved us and gave His Son so that we would not die but have eternal life. So if we take sin (s) and judgment (j) and add Jesus (J), we get a different result: Eternal Life (L), (s + j + J = L). Adding Jesus makes sense. However, Jesus did not come just as an add-on. He came to take away sin [John 1:29]. So if we, humanity (h), accept Jesus (J) into our life then He takes away sin (s) and leaves us with

peace (P) [John 14:27]. That would be written (h + J - s = P).

Hold on, class is not over yet! We cannot have Eternal Life without keeping Jesus as a permanent part of our life. It is not enough just to have Him forgive us and leave peace in our heart. Without God or infinity there is nothing everlasting. So we must each day add God to our life.

Consider this quote: "The work of transformation from unholiness to holiness is a continuous one. Day by day God labors for man's sanctification, and man is to cooperate with Him, putting forth persevering efforts in the cultivation of right habits. He is to add grace to grace; and as he thus works on the plan of addition, God works for him on the plan of multiplication" (*The Acts of the Apostles*, p. 532).

While we are doing the addition, God does the multiplication in our life. You may think that it is worthless to try because you have tried and failed before. So let's use math one more time to figure this out. If we take two negatives and add them together, we always come out with a negative. That is the rule of mathematics. The saying goes, "two wrongs don't make a right," or in mathematical terms two negatives added never equal a positive. We try to add up all the

things we do, and it always comes out in the negative.

If this has been your experience, then you should be adding God to your life and not adding up all vour own works. When we add God to our life every day, as we just learned, He works on a different level: Multiplication! According to the laws of mathematics, when you multiply two negatives they become a positive. So with God, even the negatives in life are turned into positives! So, don't forget to add God each day, and He will turn vour life into something awesome for Him!

David's story of how he killed the giant with a simple stone slung from his slingshot is a favorite story with children. There is a song that says that "the sling went round and round and round in the air, and the stone hit the giant, and the giant went tumbling down."

I made slingshots when I was young. I cut a tree branch with a perfect "Y."

Those were the days when there were no video games. I enjoyed working on the farm and had fun playing in the open air.

I also loved to collect stones. I was fascinated with the shapes and colors of stones. I still have some. I am sure that you are familiar with what marble and granite look like—smooth and shiny. Do you find such a polished stone in nature? Not quite.



Five smooth stones

The Bible tells that David "took his staff in his hand, and chose him five smooth stones out of the brook, and put them in a shepherd's bag which he had, even in a scrip; and his sling was in his hand; and he drew near to the Philistine" (1 Samuel 17:40). "He chose five smooth stones." Where did he find smooth stones? By the brook. Why are the stones by the brook smooth? Does the water make them smooth? Can the water, something so soft, smooth something so hard? How does the stone become smooth? Through the action of the water. The force of the water. particularly during rainy seasons, pushes the rocks around and they rub against each other. What is the result? Smooth stones of different shapes and sizes.

There is more to it. Did you ever wonder where sand comes from? Sand particles, called grains of

Hewing the stone to proper dimensions

The stone must be chiseled to the right proportions to fit in the building. The truth of God is the chisel; the love of God is the hammer. The polishing process involves test and trial.

"By the mighty cleaver of truth God has brought His people, as rough stones, from the quarry of the world. These stones must be squared and polished. The rough edges must be removed. This is a painful process; but it is a necessary one. Without it,

we could not be prepared for a place in God's temple. By trial, by warnings, by admonitions, God seeks to prepare us to fulfill His purpose. If we cooperate with Him, our characters will be fashioned 'after the similitude of a palace.' It is the specified work of the Comforter to transform us. At times it is hard for us to submit to the purifying, refining process. But this we must do if we would be saved at last."-The SDA Bible Commentary [E. G. White Comments], vol. 3, p. 1154. [Emphasis supplied.]

"You were rough stones with jagged edges, bruising and marring whoever you came in contact with: there is a work to be done to smooth off the rough edges. If you appreciated the value of the work that is to be done in the workshop of God. vou would welcome the blows of the ax and the hammer. Your self-esteem will be hurt, your high opinion of yourself will be cut away by the ax and the hammer, and the roughness of vour character will be smoothed off; and when self and carnal propensities are worked away. then the stone will assume proper proportions for the heavenly building, and then the polishing, refining, subduing, burnishing processes will begin, and you will be molded after the model of Christ's character."—Sons and Daughters of God, p. 319. [Emphasis supplied.]

Rough stones rub against each other in church capacity to become polished stones, and heart and character are transformed.


Have you received the **Holy Spirit?**

CAIN AND ABEL

The first baby born on earth was Cain, and Abel followed shortly after. Adam and Eve were filled with hope that one of them would be the saviour of the world. They thought that one of their boys would be the one to die for their sins. As the young men grew, Cain became a farmer and Abel a

shepherd.

THE NEED

The future holds the most wonderful possibility before us—that of actually seeing Jesus face to face. To see the One who made salvation possible, who suffered such enormous agony for a sinner like me—that would be such a wonderful experience!

Of all the promises in the Bible, the personal, visible coming of Christ holds the most precious place in the heart of a believer. Jesus said, "If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:3).

Do you look forward to that day? Unfortunately, it has been long delayed. What is Jesus waiting for? "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (Matthew 24:14). God is waiting for the gospel message to go into the whole world so that every person on this planet will have the opportunity to make an

intelligent decision regarding his or her eternal destiny.

We often hear about God's time clock and that Jesus will come whether we are ready or not. To some degree that may be true—however, the coming of Jesus depends partly on us. We are not only to be "looking for" but also to be "hastening the coming of the day of God" (2 Peter 3:12, NKJV). "It is the privilege of every Christian not only to look for but to hasten the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (*Christ's Object Lessons*, p. 69).

Who is really needed to take an active role in missionary outreach?

"With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon the message of a crucified, risen, and sooncoming Saviour might be carried to the whole world! How soon might the end come—the end of suffering and sorrow and sin!"—Education, p. 271 (emphasis added).

Recruitment officers are constantly roaming the campuses of high schools and universities to attract the brightest minds among the young. This is not just handing out literature. but actually meeting people with the goal of selling some books of eternal value. For that reason we have selected the United States as the location for the project for 2011 where in the past we have

had some success in this method of canvassing.

As Geneva had a historical significance in the Protestant Reformation as a whole, Minneapolis has great significance in the history of the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement. It was the location of the pivotal meetings of the 1888 General Conference Session in the Seventh-day Adventist Church that germinated the beginnings of the Reform Movement. In spite of the great effect of this city on the worldwide stage, there never has been a serious attempt to establish the message of truth in this place. These are today no members in the entire state of Minnesota. It is for this reason that we have selected this city for the 2011 Evangelism Project. This is why we really need your help in canvassing. 
Are you prepared to step up to the plate and meet this challenge?



My Experience With the Geneva project

In the previous issue of the Youth Messenger, there were two reports on the exciting evangelistic project held in Europe this year. Since this was such a life-changing event for many of us young people, I'd like to fill in some more details about some of our activities:

On Thursday, July 23, a total of 15 young people went to Lipik, Croatia, to attend a conference and to witness the baptism of two souls. The trip took approximately 12 hours in which we passed through different and beautiful countries like Italy and Slovenia.

We arrived about nine o'clock in the evening. Brother Mladen waited for us at the Lipik church, and from there he took us to where we would be staying. He took us to a very large house which had been almost destroyed during the Serbo-Croatian war and was being reconstructed. We received a very warm welcome from the Mandic family. The

On Friday we prepared to open the Sabbath, and in the evening we went to church for worship. The meeting was led by Etienne Lombard, one of the youth involved in the evangelistic campaign in Geneva, Switzerland.

On Sabbath we had our normal program. The Sabbath School was divided by languages. After that Peter Lausevic gave a great study that spoke of repentance and of giving our life to God. Sunday morning we went to the Dachau Concentration Camp. We were moved because for many

of us this was the first time we had ever visited such a place. First, we visited a museum that is located inside some houses, where we saw the names and nationalities of the prisoners who suffered in that place. Then, we watched a documentary that explained many things about the concentration camp. We were informed that many of the people died on their way to the camp, and that many people died in the gas chambers.

After the video we divided into groups and went to see the rooms of the "prisoners." We had a frightening feeling when we saw the great shame that rests with the twentieth century

civilization. The bathrooms were small and used by many people. There were three churches—one Evangelical church and two Catholic churches. When I entered the gas chambers and the crematorium, a chill passed through my body. I had another feeling of terror. It was a small, dark room with iron bars on the windows. On the ceiling there was a device which looked like a shower where the gas came out. We also saw the room where the corpses were cremated.

We left the concentration camp with great sadness in our hearts. We are sure that, in the day of judgment, God will render to every person according to his or her deeds.

After this we visited Munich. We had a very nice afternoon visiting spectacular sites of the city. Since the previous Thursday we had given away all the pamphlets we had, we were able to stay an extra day.

Early Monday morning a group of us went to the magnificent Neuschwanstein castle. Although we did not get to see all the inside of the Castle, we saw the sleeping quarters, the dining room, and the concert hall. After our visit in and around the castle, we were off again to Geneva.

I thank the Lord for His protection in these two great outings.

THE SALT OF THE EARTH

In a narrow street in London, England, in the quiet hours of the night, a man heard a baby crying near him. He looked around to find out where the weeping was coming from. He could not see anybody, but a strange bundle in the gutter near him attracted his attention. It contained a baby that had evidently been abandoned by an irresponsible mother. So he picked it up and took it to the nearest hospital, leaving it there.

He felt sure that the nurses would take good care of the child. And they did. They called the boy Thomas, after the name of the hospital (St. Thomas Hospital), and, in choosing a second name, they decided to call him Bridges, because there were some bridges near the hospital.

They put Thomas Bridges to school, and he grew up to become a serious-minded, clever, worthy young man. When he finished studying at the university, he began to work as a successful doctor. He was a real physician, since he understood the relationship between body, mind, and soul; so he was able to help many people by telling them about the power of the Gospel.

Mission Story

Facing Tierra del Fuego: The land of fire

One night Thomas went to attend a lecture presented by Charles Darwin, who spoke about the people that lived on the island of Tierra del Fuego. at the bottom end of South America, Darwin, who in those days was considered a great scientist, had been there in 1833 and had tried to civilize those natives, but all his efforts were in vain. He wrote about them: "The Fuegians are in a more miserable state of barbarism than I ever expected to have seen in any human being." During his lecture, Darwin explained how filthy those savages were, how they merely subsisted under the most squalid living conditions, how inhuman and cruel they were. how they would kill their old people instead of looking after them, how promptly they would stab each other to death for no good reason, how they practiced cannibalism, and so forth. Lamenting the fact that he was unable to help them, he said:

"I would rather try to civilize the dogs in London streets than the people of Tierra del Fuego."

After having heard Darwin's lecture, Thomas made up his mind to go to Tierra del Fuego.

What the great scientist was unable to achieve without

the help of God, the medical missionary was convinced that he could accomplish by the help of God. His friends were unable to hold him back despite all their dissuasive arguments.

Upon his arrival there, Thomas built his own house and kept it clean. Around the house he had a tidy garden and grew his own vegetables. He washed and mended his own clothes and kept himself neat. And he was always careful to set the best example of true Christianity before the people. Gradually the natives realized that Thomas had something which they did not have—that his ways were so much superior to theirs. So they began to come to him and ask him to teach them and help them. Thomas realized that the door had now been opened for him to evangelize the Fuegians. So, as he always showed himself willing to serve them, not only as a doctor but in many other ways, he presented to them the One who said:

"Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls" (Mathew 11:28, 29).

"I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life" (John 8:12).

Darwin is impressed

Thirty-six years after his first visit, Darwin visited Tierra del Fuego for the second time. When he got there, he thought he must have landed in the wrong place. The houses were neat and surrounded with gardens, the people were clean and neatly dressed, and their behavior revealed a high degree of civilization and decency. "Surely," Darwin said to himself, "this is not the place I visited in 1833."

Darwin was about to board his ship and set sail when Thomas met him and assured him that he had come to the very same place where he had been thirtysix years before. The surprised scientist wished to know how such a fundamental change was possible-how those whom he had regarded as below the level of domestic animals could be totally transformed. The medical missionary explained to him: "It is only the power of God that can do a thing like this. You see, the coming of His Word brings light." Thomas referred to the following scriptural verse:

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding

unto the simple" (Psalm 119:130). Darwin changed his mind about the power of the Gospel and the work of the foreign missions.

He wrote:


"I certainly should have predicted that not all the missionaries in the world could have done what has been done [on Tierra del Fuego]. It is wonderful and it shames me, as I have always prophesied a failure. It is a grand success."

When the scientist was convinced, by the evidence that he had seen with his own eyes, that the Gospel (not the theory of evolution, but the Gospel) is the only reformatory power that can work changes such as the ones he had witnessed on Tierra del Fuego, he wrote to the London Missionary Society:

"I shall feel proud if your committee shall think fit to elect me as honorary member of your society."

And in his letter Darwin enclosed a donation for the gospel missions—twenty-five pounds, which was a lot of money at that time. Jesus said:

"Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be salted? it is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men" (Matthew 5:13).



What is the difference between the work of an apostle and that of a prophet?

"God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healings, helps, governments, diversities of tongues" (1 Corinthians 12:28, emphasis added).

a. The work of an apostle is primarily for those outside the church in raising up new companies of believers and administrating the church for that purpose.

b. The work of a prophet is specifically for the church itself. "Wherefore tongues are for a sign, not to them that believe. but to them that believe not: but prophesying serveth not for them that believe not, but for them which believe" (1 Corinthians 14:22, emphasis supplied). After the apostles have done their work, then follows that of the prophets. Their work is for the purpose of counseling, encouraging, and building up of the church. "For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:12).

Christian education

The prophet Samuel established schools, and Elijah later reestablished them, after they had gone into decay. His concern for these schools is seen in his final round of visits before his

departure from earth. Elisha continued the task.

Like the ancient prophets, Ellen G. White spanned many areas of Bible present truth, including in the work of education. Books such as Education, Counsels to Parents, Teachers, and Students, and Fundamentals of Christian Education reveal amazing principles that could change the world.

"Now, as never before, we need to understand the true science of education. If we fail to understand this, we shall never have a place in the kingdom of God. 'This is life eternal, that they might know Thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom Thou hast sent' (John 17:3). If this is the price of heaven, shall not our education be conducted on these lines?"—*Mind Character, and Personality*, vol. 1, p. 53.

Health

The Bible has a grave concern for the health of God's creation. "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth" (3 John 2). Our bodies are to be a healthy living sacrifice to God, not some degenerated matter. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service" (Romans 12:1). We can then expect a

comprehensive modern day prophet to address the subject of health reform. Her first vision on the health message was given on June 6, 1863, in Otswego, Michigan. This vision covered issues such as healthful living, disease and its causes, and drugs and their evil effects.

At the time Ellen White's writings on health first appeared, this subject had been almost wholly ignored. Myths abounded. People thought smoking was good for you. But the Lord's messenger revealed the truth about this and many other health topics in a way that was far in advance of her time.

Have the principles presented stood the test of time and experience? Definitely yes!
Modern, state-of-the-art science is finally catching up with what Ellen White wrote over 100 years ago.

Additional areas

Besides education and health, there are more areas in which the writings of Ellen White provide divine instruction, including science, management, mental health, child rearing, marital relations, history, prophecy, oratory, and biblical principles of interpretation. With such a wealth of resources, who needs Sigmund Freud and other humanistic sources of counseling?

Practical help

Many who read any of Ellen White's books and, who don't know anything about her say: "When I read her articles it seems to me as though her writings are inspired." As we consider some of these facts, we are urged to follow the words of King Jehoshaphat of Judah in their time of crisis: "And they rose early in the morning, and went forth into the wilderness of Tekoa: and as they went forth, Jehoshaphat stood and said, Hear me, O Judah, and ye inhabitants of Jerusalem; Believe in the Lord your God, so shall ve be established; believe his prophets, so shall ye prosper" (2 Chronicles 20:20).

The prophetic Spirit in the last days?

In the book of Joel there is a prophecy about the last days of this earth's history. "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh" (2:28). The apostle Peter refers to this "afterward" as the last days. "But this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel; and it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh" (Acts 2:16, 17).

The context of these last days, although partially fulfilled in the time of the apostles, has a direct fulfillment as we approach the close of time. Joel 2:30, 31. The fulfillment of the prophecy would

have specific significance after May 19, 1780.

To prepare the church for these last days, God will give them His Holy Spirit in a special measure. What will be the special gifts given by the Holy Spirit? The Lord has declared: "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions: and also upon the servants and upon the handmaids in those days will I pour out my spirit" (verses 28, 29). Who are the only ones that will respond to this work of the Holy Spirit? "And it shall come to pass, that whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be delivered: for in mount Zion and in Jerusalem shall be deliverance, as the Lord hath said, and in the remnant whom the Lord shall call" (verse 32).

It is the work of the prophets that prepare the remnant for the closing events of earth's history. What parallel prophecy in the New Testament shows that prophets will have a major role at the end of time? "And the dragon was wroth with the woman, and went to make war with the remnant of her seed, which keep the commandments of God, and have the testimony of Jesus Christ" (Revelation 12:17).

What is this testimony of Jesus?

"The testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy" (Revelation 19:10). This does not mean Jesus is speaking directly to us. It is Christ speaking through prophets. Their work is to prepare a people, the remnant, for the end of time. What will be their characteristic? "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is" (1 John 3:2). It is the work of prophets to prepare a people to be like Jesus at the second coming. This was the work that Ellen G. White did in her lifetime, and her writings continue to carry forth this work even after her death.

But what if ...?

What if these claims are false? What would we do then with these writings? In the Old Testament, the Lord directed that false prophets be removed from the camp (see Deuteronomy 13:5). And in the New Testament, those that taught false doctrine were to be avoided (see Romans 16:17). Too often, a person would like a portion here and a portion there, rather than accepting the whole message as it is given through the Spirit of Prophecy. This is usually true only if a person does not like the reproof that he or she is reading. But we are to either

accept the whole message or reject it.

"God has given us, as His servants, our work. He has given us a message to bear to His people. . . . We have been receiving the words of God and speaking them to His people. We have trembled at the responsibility, which we have accepted with much prayer and meditation. We have stood as God's ambassadors, in Christ's stead beseeching souls to be reconciled to God. We have warned of danger as God has presented before us the perils of His people. . . . God is either teaching His church, reproving their wrongs and strengthening their faith, or He is not. This work is of God, or it is not. God does nothing in partnership with Satan. My work for the past thirty years bears the stamp of God or the stamp of the enemy. There is no halfway work in the matter. The Testimonies are of the Spirit of God, or of the devil. In arraying vourself against the servants of God you are doing a work either for God or for the devil."-Testimonies, vol. 4, pp. 229, 230.

If the writings of the Spirit of Prophecy have falsehood, then drop the whole matter. But if they are accurate, then realize that God is speaking to you through them!

Sometimes in Life

cometimes in life temptations arise from every corner. We look at our life and are overwhelmed with all our faults and how many times we have given in and fallen. We are discouraged and just continue to sin and think, "Oh, what's the use; I've already sinned and fallen so many times." Little do we realize that this is a temptation in itself. The devil wants us to think so little of ourselves that we don't try to find a way out of our sins but continue wallowing in them. We forget to look up to a Higher Power that can help us. Yes, we cannot on our own overcome our sins, but we can ask for help. God has promised grace and mercy to all that ask.

Sometimes in life we need to be reminded of how much God values us: "For thou hast made him a little lower than the angels, and hast crowned him with glory and honour" (Psalm 8:5). We do our part, and He will be faithful to do His! Let us never allow our temptations to discourage us, but let them remind us of our need to accept the Gift of Calvary!

Temptations and anxiety are callings for you to pray! "In the gift of Jesus, God gave all heaven."—The Desire of Ages, p. 565. And it was all given for you and me! Then as we appreciate this gift, we become encouraged to help others understand about it also. This is why we do missionary work. God comforts us "in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God" (2 Corinthians 1:4). As we lift up others, we are amazed to find that our own hearts become encouraged as well. So don't give up—and don't give up on cheering up others, too!
